
Then, he takes the treasures to the Lost and Found, where people come to look for things they have lost on the beach.

"I will," promised Connie. "That means no chat rooms other than the one your school uses," said Dad. "No talking to strangers and no giving out your name, address or email."


> "I won't," promised Connie. "And if something doesn't seem right, I'll tell you or Mom."
